Keeping children safe online.

- ▶ We all have a part to play in keeping children safe online.

- ▶ There are a number of websites that you can access that will be able to offer advice to help you as a family stay safe online.



Talking to your child about online safety.

Online Wellbeing

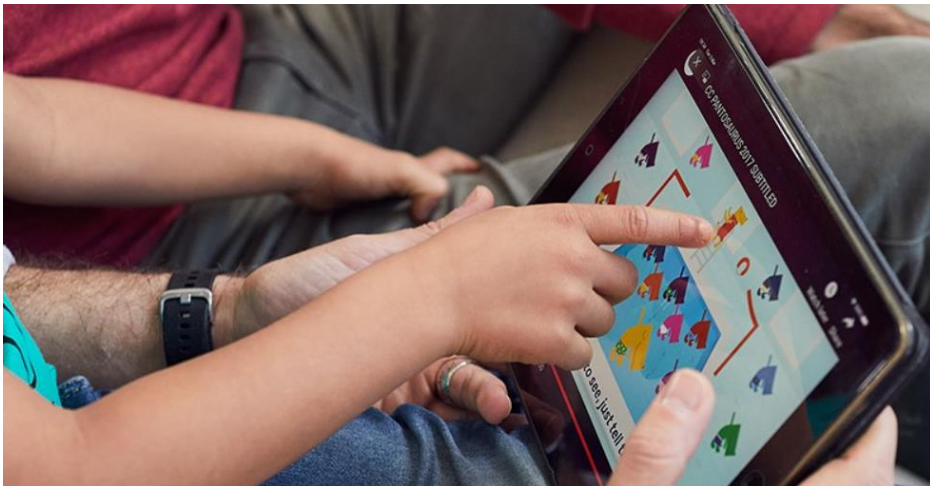
- ▶ The internet has many positives for both adults and children.
- ▶ This can include keeping in touch with friends and family that do not live close.
- ▶ Using the internet to learn about the world we live in.
- ▶ There will be challenges along the way as well. The online world can be tricky to navigate.
- ▶ Some children may find it overwhelming keeping up with their friends and feel pressurised too.
- ▶ As a parent noticing how your child is affected by being online is the first step in helping them manage their wellbeing.
- ▶ There are a few things that you can do:
 - ▶ Manage the content that your children see
 - ▶ Ensure the suitability of interactions your children have.
 - ▶ Manage how long they have screen time for in balance with other activities.

Parental Controls

- ▶ The internet is a marvellous source of information and services. However, there at times the content may be inappropriate for children.
- ▶ As a parent you are able to you decide what is appropriate for your child.
- ▶ Parental controls give you the ability to block and filter inappropriate or upsetting content.
- ▶ These controls can work across you Wifi, phone network, individual apps and devices.

Risks of Social Media



- ▶ Children may feel the pressure to share a lot of personal information online.
- ▶ Many apps and games gives users the option to share their location.
- ▶ Some social networks promotes connecting users to talk to people they don't know.
- ▶ Young people may feel the pressure into sharing content that could be harmful to them or others.
- ▶ With the new wave of influencers children may feel the pressure to conform to an ideal body or lifestyle.
- ▶ Children could become obsessed with how many likes they have received on a post or comments.

Online Games and Apps.

- ▶ There are online games for children to play that played sensibly are great for children.
- ▶ Roblox is one example and is the ultimate virtual universe that lets children create, share experiences with friends and be anything you can imagine.
- ▶ Another popular game is Minecraft. It is a game made up of blocks, creatures and community.
- ▶ If users are playing a multiplayer game the invite their friends to join by messaging a code.
